## Vulcan Gets His Big Break

We don't normally encourage dropping an object off Vulcan's tower, but on April 10 we'll be making an exception. Vulcan is teaming up with the UAB School of Engineering for UAB's 26th Annual Brent Newman Memorial Egg Drop Competition. An estimated 500 elementary, middle and high school students will attend.

Working in teams, students will arrive at Vulcan from throughout the metro area. Each team will bring a device they hope will carry an egg from the observation deck safely to the ground 124 feet below.

UAB School of Engineering student Blake Feltman is one of the many college-age organizers behind this year's program. "Egg drop competitions engage the younger generation of students in STEM areas, such as physics, fluid dynamics and materials science. Through the egg drop competition, UAB is able to promote and enhance students' applied critical thinking capacities," Feltman says.

Vulcan's staff is working behind the scenes to make this competition a success – spurred in part by the symbolism of Vulcan himself. In ancient mythology, Vulcan was known as an avid inventor. This competition encourages students to tap into the same creative spirit. "Virtually all the great innovations made here in Birmingham have been accomplished under the watchful eye of Vulcan. Vulcan's famous pose depicts him admiring a spear, a product of his own craftsmanship and ingenuity," says Vulcan Park and Museum Director of Education Phillip Ratliff.

Prizes will be given to the first, second and third place in elementary, middle and high school age groups. There are



also awards for "Most Creative Device," "Biggest Splat," and the grand prize for "Overall Best Contraption."

In addition to the egg drop at the tower, there will be tours in the museum highlighting the city's history

of technology and innovation. UAB students will be on site with science and engineering demonstrations.

As a twist, Vulcan will hold an adult egg drop called The Great Fall on March 26, 2015, to serve as a fundraiser for the children's event two weeks later

on April 10. Adult teams will work to help Vulcan hit its fundraising goal of \$5,000. If interested in participating, go to visitvulcan.com/events.

## Vulcan AfterTunes Celebrates a Decade of Music Atop Red Mountain

Last fall, Vulcan Park and Museum marked the 10th anniversary of its Vulcan AfterTunes concert. When we inaugurated the event a decade ago, public response was overwhelming. We knew we had found a winning formula that appealed to Birmingham audiences craving independent music performed in a unique venue.

The 2014 series continued the AfterTunes legacy. Here's a rundown of what audiences enjoyed in October.

Indie rock septet The Revivalists kicked off the line-up. Their performance at Vulcan featured tracks from their latest album, City of Sound. Together since 2007, the New Orleans based band proved that they are not afraid to toss up genres, mixing rock, heavy steel guitar and occasional electronic dabbling with the southern funk of their hometown. Next up was another New Orleans original, Dumpstaphunk, who debuted in 2003 at the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival and have been grooving across the nation ever since. They, too, hold true to the origins of funk, while not being afraid to let elements of gospel, blues, R&B and a touch of rock 'n' roll sneak into their music. In 2013, they released their latest album, Dirty Word, featuring Flea, of Red Hot Chili Peppers, along with guest appearances from other friends and family.

Our final concert featured Milo Greene. The quintet is a cinematic pop group out of Los BANDS BREWS TASTES

Vulcan was not Birmingham's first World's Fair exhibit. The city had sent a giant relief map highlighting the region's mineral resources to the famed 1893 Columbian Exposition in Chicago.

The Vulcan statue currently sitting atop Red Mountain is not the first instance where the Roman god of the forge had been used to represent the city's iron industry. As early as 1885, an image of Vulcan bearded and naked to the waist, appeared in a regional trade publication.

**3** Vulcan got his famous traffic safety torch in 1946. Funded by the Birmingham Jaycees and placed in Vulcan's outstretched hand by sign maker

Ralph Fesperman, the torch was intended as a temporary campaign to encourage motorists to drive safely. Vulcan held his torch for over fifty years.

Vulcan's relationship with Electra, atop • the Alabama Power Building, has been the subject of intense media speculation for decades. Some claim to have witnessed Vulcan leaving his pedestal at night to frolic with the iconic statue of Electra, pointing to giant Vulcan foot-

> sized potholes in Birmingham roads as evidence.

Also the subject of intense media scrutiny is Vulcan's exposed backside. When Capitol Park (now Linn Park) was proposed as a permanent home for Vulcan, nearby residents balked. Vulcan's pedestal atop Red Mountain, it was determined. provided a more suitable vantage point for Birmingham.

Much has been said about the view of Vulcan that Homewood

residents enjoy. In the 1980s, radio personality Jack Voorhies parodied over-the-mountain angst about Vulcan's iron derriere with his recording, "Moon Over Homewood." The song remains to this day a local cult classic.

## FUN FACT

Almost ninety years ago, Vulcan's love affair with Electra fascinated Birmingham. Some even claimed spotting the iron man walking to meet his shiny new girlfriend.



#### La Storia: Birmingham's Italian Community

A good museum exhibit interests you. A great museum exhibit touches you. Since opening in September 2014, La Storia: Birmingham's Italian Community has touched thousands of visitors.

It's easy to see why visitors are drawn to the exhibit's great story. When Italian immigrants began arriving in Birmingham in the late 1800s, they weren't always welcomed. Job opportunities were limited and the pay was slight. But Birmingham Italians persevered to become successful professionals and entrepreneurs.

Consider that it was an Italian American, sculptor Giuseppe Moretti, who created Vulcan in 1904 and Italian stonemasons who gave Vulcan his tower in the 1930s!

Vulcan, in partnership with the Italian American Heritage Society, will tell this story in La Storia: Birmingham's Italian Community through September 2015. ## A GIANT IMPACT - Q&A

## Why is Vulcan Park and Museum vital for Birmingham?

Vulcan is the symbol of Birmingham and the view from Vulcan is the best of the city. I remember visiting Vulcan as a child and being in awe of his colossal size and the spectacular view of the valley. Whenever friends and relatives from out of town visit us, a trip to Vulcan is a must-do. Since Vulcan showcases the city of Birmingham, we must ensure that Vulcan Park and Museum is a beautiful attraction.

## What has been your most rewarding experience with Vulcan?

My most interesting experience with Vulcan actually occurred in Evansville, Indiana, where I learned that our Vulcan is known far and wide. Over the years I have written articles on all of the courthouses of Alabama. During my research I discovered that an early Jefferson County courthouse was built at the same time, designed by the same architect and constructed by the same contractor as the courthouse in Evansville. The only difference was that our courthouse had been demolished in the 1930's and their courthouse was re-purposed as a community building and still standing. On a trip to Evansville, I found Vulcan in the center of the lower courthouse rotunda. In this depiction, he was a nine-and-a-half-foot high statue and stood with a plow. Evansville had been the home of the Vulcan Plow Company and when its factory was torn down in 1957, a rooftop statue of Vulcan was restored and placed in the courthouse. A marker on the display noted that a huge statue of Vulcan was in Birmingham, Alabama. It was quite a surprise to see the reference to our "Iron Man" in an Indiana courthouse.

#### Why is it important for Birmingham to learn more about the Italian Community and its history?

The La Storia exhibition at the Vulcan Museum highlights the many contributions of our Italianheritage community in Birmingham. It is truly meaningful to me because my four grandparents and my father were born in Sicily. I feel that visitors will come away with the message that despite hardships and discrimination, when our immigrant communities are given a chance to work hard they thrive and excel in this country.
