Discovering La Storia

The *La Storia: Birmingham's Italian Community* exhibition opened in Linn-Henley Gallery in September. Since then, individuals and groups have visited Vulcan Park and Museum to learn about the rich Italian heritage of Birmingham and how its culture helped shape our community.

In October, the Junior Patrons of the Birmingham Museum of Art held an event at Vulcan Park and Museum and toured *La Storia.* The group had an overwhelmingly positive experience in the exhibition that a few of its members had to share.

"The *La Storia* exhibit was mesmerizing, and our group was buzzing with lively conversation long after our tour," said Lee Handley, a member of the Junior Patrons of the Birmingham Museum of Art. "We learned so much about the history of our city in an impactful way. Many of our guests even returned to the exhibit and remained there until the end of the evening."

Another member of the Junior Patrons, Vincent J. "V. J." Graffeo commented on the high quality of the exhibit and its ability to successfully portray the story of Italian immigrants in Birmingham.

"Being a Birmingham-born Italian American, it was very interesting to see the story of my ancestors who traveled across the Atlantic and settled here. The pictures, objects and narratives told a poignant story," said Graffeo. "The exhibit very elegantly and informatively portrays a piece of Birmingham's history and the notable Italians in the community, and it is great that Vulcan is able to display such a high-quality exhibit in a temporary gallery."

Leadership Birmingham also toured *La Storia*, and Michele Forman, Director of Media Studies at UAB and member of the current Leadership Birmingham class, shared her positive experience of the exhibit.

"I learned so much about the rich contributions of the Italian-

American community in Birmingham when our Leadership Birmingham group toured the *La Storia* exhibition," said Forman. "I loved seeing the old photographs and artifacts in combination with the video oral histories, and I am especially proud of our UAB students who had such an amazing opportunity to participate in the making of those."

Forman also returned with out-of-town visitors who had an Italian heritage. "They were so moved by *La Storia* since they had no idea of the cultural diversity in Birmingham," said Forman.

La Storia will remain in Linn-Henley Gallery through September 9, 2015. If your group is interested in a private tour, please give us a call. The group package is \$10 per person and includes entrance to the *La Storia* exhibit, a keepsake book of the exhibit and entrance into Vulcan Center museum and the observation balcony. For a nominal fee, one of our knowledgeable docents will provide your group with a detailed historical perspective of the intricate display. Additionally, we have wonderful packages arranged with food and wine for your group to have a private reception or packages whereby your group can enjoy lunch or dinner at Vulcan along with a private tour.

The next exhibit coming to Linn-Henley Gallery is *Darkness into Life: Alabama Holocaust Survivors through Photography and Art.*

This educational exhibit features the stories of Alabama Holocaust survivors and offers an in-depth understanding of Holocaust history and its impact

PRESERVING THE ORIGINAL IRON MAN

In 1999, our region's beloved symbol had fallen into such a state of disrepair that the city had to take emergency action to close the park rather than have park visitors endangered by falling bits of rusted iron.

After a \$16 million nationally recognized restoration of the statue, renovation of the park and addition of the museum, Vulcan has once again stood proudly as our grand civic symbol, and Vulcan Park Foundation is committed to keep Vulcan in excellent condition - for many generations to come.

Created to represent the young city of Birmingham, and the state of Alabama, at the 1904 St. Louis World's Fair, Vulcan was displayed inside the Palace of Mines and Metallurgy. Giuseppe Moretti designed the statue with this protected environment in mind, leaving the top of Vulcan's head open. When Vulcan was erected outdoors, an ill fitted "toupee," which served as a maintenance hatch, was added. By the 1990s, due to years of water infiltration through the head, along with other poorly conceived modifications, exposure to the elements had taken its toll. When Vulcan Park Foundation undertook the massive job of restoring Vulcan, it was imperative that this project be done correctly and in a manner that would stand the test of time – not in terms of one or two generations, but for a century or more. The painstaking attention to detail observed through the restoration process resulted in the project's receipt in 2006 of the nation's highest honor in historic preservation, the National Trust for Historic Preservation Honor Award.

Ongoing preventative maintenance is required to preserve Vulcan for the future. Each year, Vulcan receives a physical, wherein experts examine the statue inside and out. Any maintenance needs, such as caulking cracks or tightening bolts, are addressed. To protect the exterior, Vulcan must be periodically painted.

The costs for Vulcan's maintenance are in keeping with his size – colossal. Your attendance at Vulcan Park and Museum events, your use of our private event facility and contributions of your time or financial resources all help us to achieve our primary goal – to preserve our Vulcan as the enduring symbol of who we are and who we hope to be in the many years to come.

Our Vulcan has graced Birmingham with his presence for 111 years, and growing up in Jefferson County, Alabama, one tends to have fond memories of the honorable, iconic statue. This holds true for one exceptional Vulcan Park and Museum employee.

Pam Ellis has worked as a visitor services representative for almost nine years. In those years, she has greeted dignitaries, educated thousands of school children, and welcomed many international visitors.

"One of my favorite things – and I have a lot – about working at Vulcan Park and Museum is meeting people that come to see Vulcan from all over the world," Pam said. "Vulcan truly is a worldwide icon. I have met visitors from France, the United Kingdom, Italy, Denmark, Sweden, Australia, China, Japan, Vietnam, Germany, Poland and Canada.

Pam says it's special that guests witness the most spectacular view in Birmingham – day or night – while studying our city's history.

> While meeting and greeting international guests is compelling for Pam, she has also had many experiences with local visitors that she remembers fondly.

"After visiting with a lady here at the park, I learned that she was leaving the country the following day," she said. "Shortly after she left, I noticed her wallet sitting on the gift shop counter. I bolted outside and ran quickly down the hill to catch her so she wouldn't be missing it when she arrived at the airport. I still remember her thankfulness to this day."

Another significant impact that Pam is proud to have is that on our school-aged visitors. She says: "Sometimes, a student could be afraid to go up to the observation tower. I calmly settle them and let them know

what they will see when they reach the top. I tell them to take in the city view and to look for low-flying airplanes coming in for a landing at the airport in the distance. When the kids come back to ground level, they are amazed at the cool things they have seen and they aren't afraid anymore."

Those stories are really what it's all about for Pam and the entire Vulcan Park and Museum staff. She repeatedly says that one of the most rewarding aspects of her job is being able to make the guests feel special at this place she feels is peaceful and tranquil.

For Pam, working at Vulcan Park and Museum is not only a job, it reaches her deeper than just that. "Vulcan represents me. Vulcan represents everyone in this city. Vulcan is our symbol of unity."

A GIANT IMPACT

When planning programs and exhibitions at Vulcan Park and Museum, all ages and backgrounds are taken into consideration in an effort to make an enormous impression on our community members. This includes students – one particular student in fact.

Briarwood Christian School rising fifth grader, Christopher Vizzina, visited the museum and the *La Storia: Birmingham's Italian Community* exhibition shortly after its launch in the fall of 2014. This tour, for Christopher, wasn't just something brand new for him – Christopher happens to be a fifth-generation Sicilian American in Birmingham. This experience was like a step back in time to learn more about his Sicilian American heritage and where his family originated.

"My great great grandfather is from Vizzini, Sicily. I visited Sicily in 2014 with my mom [Carolyn], dad [Chris] and my godmother Aunt Rose Sarris and her family (Uncle George Sarris and Yorgo Sarris)," Christopher said. "Both my dad and Aunt Rose's family are from Sicily." Prior to coming to see *La Storia*, Christopher already knew several things about his heritage. In reference to the Sicilian Americans who migrated to Birmingham, Christopher said: "They all lived in one neighborhood, they liked to cook, and they had big families."

After studying the gallery exhibit thoroughly, Christopher said he was able to learn much more than what he knew about why the Sicilian people migrated to Birmingham – to build a life for their families in an industrially progressing country. "They started a lot of different businesses," he said. A lot of those businesses are still present and successful in Birmingham today.

Christopher says he is very proud to be of Sicilian lineage. His journey through *La Storia* gave him the understanding he needed to help with his school book report on Italy. He was even able to encourage his entire class to take a field trip to see *La Storia*.

Talk about impact...we'd call that giant!
